

OCTOBER MEETING

This evenings meeting must have the longest title ever "A BIRTHPLACE OF THE ANTHROPOCENE: THE ROLE OF THE NORTH EAST IN MAKING OUR FOSSIL-FUEL WORLD". Our speaker is Dr. Scott Ashley

Let us not speculate on what our speaker has to say but "The Anthropocene defines Earth's most recent geologic time period as being human-influenced, or anthropogenic, based on overwhelming global evidence that atmospheric, geologic, hydrologic, biospheric and other earth system processes are now altered by humans.



The word combines the root "anthropo", meaning "human" with the root "-cene", the standard suffix for "epoch" in geologic time.

The Anthropocene is distinguished as a new period either after or within the Holocene, the current epoch, which began approximately 10,000 years ago (about 8000 BC) with the end of the last glacial period".



Our speaker is Dr Scott Ashley is a lecturer in medieval history at Newcastle University, a historian of the end of the Roman world and the emergence of the early middle ages in Europe. His interest in this period stems from his childhood in the North-East of England and memories of family visits to Hadrian's Wall, the Anglo-Saxon Lindisfarne and churches in the region. That interest has taken him far afield, from Oxford to the United States and Hungary, before taking up a full-time position at Newcastle in 2002.
